CHUCK BERRY IN MANX FEST

NME UNDERSTANDS that Chuck Berry is to headline a major one-day festival in the Isle of Man during the week set aside for the annual T.T. motor-cycle races. It is planned for Douglas Lido on June 6, with a supporting bill that features several leading British rock revival outfits — including Shakin' Stevens and the Sunsets, Remember This and Crazy Cavan 'n' the Rhythm Rockers. This will be part of a full European tour by Chuck Berry, and among his Continental dates are two shows at Paris Olympia on May 25 and an appearance at Lyons Palais des Sports the following day.

TOUR NEWS ROUND-UP

THREE DEGREES have now confirmed the three remaining venues in their British tour, which follows their weeklong engagement at the London Palladium starting April 12. They are Manchester Golden Garter (May 3 week), Stockport Davenport Theatre (30) and Skegmess Sands Showbar (31). All other dates were reported by NME three weeks ago. SUPERCHARGE are playing a string

SUPERCHARGE are playing a string of one-nighters to promote their new single "Get Down Boogie". They apear at Manchester Didsbury College of Education (March 24), Dudley J.B.'s Club (26), Leicester Polytechnic (27), Chester Quaintways (29), Southport Dixieland Showbar (30) and Wolverhampton Lafavette (31). Their debut album "Local Lads Make Good" is issued by Virgin on April 30.

- STVLISTICS are to play two additional peformances at the London Palladium on Monday. April 5. These extra shows have been set because their two previously-reported dates at this venue have now completely sold out. Tickets for the additional gigs are now on sale at the Palladium box-office. The group have also added two shows at **Dublin** Carlton to their itinerary.
- CHARLEY PRIDE returns to Britain for an extensive concert tour in the auturn, promoted by Jeffrey Kruger for Ember Concert Division. Dates so far confirmed are London Palladium (November 7) and Southport New Theatre (10 and 11). Other venues are being fialised. Support acts will be Gary Stewart and Dave & Sugar.
- GROUNDHOGS are to undertake another series of British concert and college dates in June, due to the success of their current comeback tour. This

STACKRIDGE have cancelled their scheduled appearance at London Shaftesbury Theatre on March 28 because, instead, they played a major London gig at the Chalk Farm Roundhouse last Sunday. Two dates in their current tour itinerary have been rescheduled. They appear at **Bath** Pavilion on April 1 instead of March 24, and at **Yeovil** Johnson Hall on April 6 instead of yesterday (Wednesday).

BOBBY WOMACK has been confirmed for two more gigs during his brief MAN have made two changes to their current tour itinerary, adding **Ipswich** Gaumont on March 26 and postponing **Swindon** Dasis Centre (27). They are also considering adding a further five concerts to their schedule in the first week of April. The band's new album "The Welsh Connection" is released tomorrow (Friday).

JOHN MILES is now confirmed for a string of solo gigs, after appearing as support act on Robin Trower's recent concerts. He plays Lancaster University (tomorrow, Friday), Stirling University (Saturday), Nelson The Column (March 26), Newcastle University (28), Chester Quaintways (29), Oxford College of Education (31), Tunbridge Wells Court Club April 1), Cromer West Runton Pavilion (2) and Birmingham Barbarella's (3).

SHOWADDYWADDY are playing a few dates to promote their new album "Trocadero", issued on April 9. They are at Leicester Bailey's from tonight (Thursday) for three days, then visit Manchester Broadway (March 24 for four days), Manchester Wythenshawe Forum (28), Watford Bailey's (April 7) and Derby Bailey's (8 for three days). These will be their last gigs until they headline an extensive autumn tour. The title track from their new album is issued as a single on March 26.

RICK WAKEMAN'S debut British tour with the English Rock Ensemble has undergone a few changes. It now opens with two shows at **Ipswich** Gaumont on April 19, instead of one show on April 20 as previously announced. And the gig at **Leicester** De Montfort Hall is brought forward from April 27 to 20. The tinerary is otherwise unchanged, except that a

JONI MITCHELL has cancelled her spring tour of Britain and Europe, which was to have included four major gigs in this country at London Hammersmith Odeon (May 27, 28 and 29) and Glasgow Apollo (31), all of which were completely sold out. These would have been her first appearances in this country since she played Wembley Stadium in 1974.

Ticket-holders are asked to apply for cash refunds. Those purchased from the MAM Organisation should be returned to that office, enclosing a stamped selfaddressed envelope, while those obtained from agencies should be returned to the point of purchase. Promoter Barry Dickins says that he has hopes of re-scheduling Joni's dates for later in the year.

The gigs have officially been cancelled on medical grounds. A spokesman said that Joni collapsed in New York recently, suffering from physical exhaustion after a severe bout of flu, and she has been advised by doctors not to undertake any touring for several months. He added: "There's a rumour going round that she has broken up with her boy friend John Guerin and, because he is a member of the L.A. Express, this has caused the tour to be called off. But I am here to tell you that this report simply isn't true."
