Joni and the Cars come to the rescue

A S the sluggish summer season grinded to a halt, two fine outdoor concerts rescued New York. Joni Mitchell played her jazz at Forest Hills, and the Cars prayed to the ghost of "96 Tears" in Central Park.

With a band that includes Pat Metheny, Lyle Mays, Michael Brecker, and Jaco Pastorius, Joni included a selection from "Mingus," showing the range of her work while managing to unify it in the contemporary form. Her encore was "Shadows And Light," performed mostly acapella, with the Persuasions in support. Time, many people feel, for a new live album to preserve these interpretations.

The Cars played a sodden Wollman's Skating Rink, but the dark-

ness of the night didn't stop a frolic. The sense of Roy Thomas Baker's artful production was preserved on stage as Rik Ocasek and Benjamin Orr ticked through "Let The Good Times Roll," "Let's Go," and "My Best Friend's Girl." "Double Life" missed the exquisitely shifting emphasis in rhythm between drum machine, drums and plucked guitar, but "Bye Bye Love," sung by Orr, shimmered with moody power.

Frampton-alive again

PETER Frampton returned to Los Angeles with a concert at the Forum which wasn't sold out at show-time. Three years ago, Frampton did five nights at the 18,000-seat arena. Much of that audience has vanished, however, and so has Frampton's chart position.

Despite all that, the gig was fine. The older tunes, mostly taken from his recordbreaking live double-album, were greeted with applause, and the new songs were recognised right off the bat. He has some very loyal fans, who still scream, and the two-hour performance wasn't a waste of my time. His career has nosedived since the Sgt Pepper movie and his serious car accident, but Frampton just played his music like he did on the 1976 tour, when he was at a peak. ing his own radio programme debuting in late September Saturday night from 2 to 6 am on KPFK-FM (90.7). The rock show will be called Hep Cats From Hell. "The show", Meltzer says, "is the equivalent of having people over and listening to music, drinking a few. I won't play any David Bowie, Brian Eno, Rickie Lee Jones, or the Cars. There'll be lots of Jim Morrison and the Doors, and live new wave tapes from the Hong Kong Cafe. Studio guests will also be present. I'll also play Michael Pagliaro, who is the greatest rocker in North America, except he's from Canada and sings mostly in French."

THIS week A&M Records announced that it had fired 34 employees and had dissolved its Horizon label. The Hollywood music industry was a bit surprised by A&M's actions, considering the label is charting with Supertramp, the Police, Joe Jackson and others. Horizon, a relatively new jazz label headed by Tommy LiPuma, is expected to place several of its acts on the A&M rooster. Those mentioned so far include Dr John, Neil Larsen and Brenda Russell.

EVERY week clubs and discos are opening in Southern California. This week the Marina Bistro switched to a new wave format, and bookings for September include Passenger, Bates Motel, the Weirz, 707, Snapp with Steve Diamond, the Model and the Mechanics. The Whiskey hasan impressive September line-up: X, the Chambers Brothers, Snow, Michael Nesmith, Magazine, Human Hands and the return of the Cowsills.
